All Star Quilters' Guild General Meeting Minutes December 21, 2020

The meeting was called to order by Guild President Kathi Thompson at 10:05 AM. There were 28 members present at the church and 17 members joined via Zoom. All Covid19 safety precautions were observed.

The minutes of the November 16, 2020 Guild meeting were approved as previously distributed.

Treasurer's Report

Ellen Cannon reported that as of November 30, 2020, the balance in the Guild's VyStar account

was \$13,663.91. Income for the period totaled \$273.00, and expenses totaled \$231.19.

- Projected expenses for 2021 include the following:
- \$1,000.00 to be given to Renewing Dignity in 2021
- \$2.500.00 to the church
- \$150.00 for Zoom membership (not previously projected in the 2021 budget)

Members present at the meeting approved the \$150.00 expenditure for Zoom membership.

Community Service - Mindy Ashby

Mindy reported the following totals for the Guild's community service activities to date.

PedsCare 40 quilts 16 pillowcases daniel 34 quilts 13 pillowcases Safe Harbor 11 quilts 5 pillowcases Hart Felt Ministries 97 quilts 7 pillowcases 67 Christmas socks \$265 cash

St. Augustine VA home 7 fidget quilts Mandarin Food Bank \$2,390 in food and/or cash donations.

The total value of guilt donations, cash and food donations totals \$27,265.00 for the year.

The fabric sale netted \$124.00, but \$213.00 was spent on batting for charity quilts.

Mindy thanked Guild members who quilted the charity quilts: Betty Ann Agnew, Delia Bright, Pat D'Elia and Mable Holliman. She also thanked Sharon Buquo, Donna Caldarise and June Daniels who also assisted with community service projects.

Education - Kathi Thompson

Outgoing Guild president Kathi Thompson reported that she will be serving as Education Chair for 2021. She displayed a sample of an Attic Windows quilt that will be taught as a class by Lori from Scrappy Rooster on February 22, 2021, from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM. The cost of the class will be \$10.00. Materials needed include one panel and three half-yards of coordinating fabric.

Kathi stated that there are five Mondays in March, and she is working on plans for a class for that fifth Monday.

Margie Engel has canceled her class. Refunds will be issued, and the class will be rescheduled to a later date.

Membership - Lisa Anderson

Lisa reported that 94 members have renewed, and there are three new members. There are 28 people at the in-person portion of today's meeting. Door prizes were won by Sue Abbey and Angie Moore.

The winner of the November early bird renewal drawing was Pris Roehm. In order to be included in the December early bird renewal drawing, renewals must be in by December 31. For members' information to be included in the Membership Book, all renewals need to be received by January 15, 2021. Dues payments should be sent directly to Susan Sharpe. Susan Sharpe and June Daniels will be Membership Co-chairs for 2021.

Newsletter - Sunnie Malesky

Kathi read an email from Sunnie who will be the newsletter editor in 2021. Sunnie outlined her plans for 2021 and asked for ideas and suggestions for the newsletter from members.

- In response to requests from several members, a block of the month will appear in each newsletter. Each block will be related to the month in some way but not necessarily meant to be put together with any of the other months
- The newsletter will contain a Marketplace section where members may advertise items for sale. Members will be asked to limit sale items to three and to indicate whether the item is free or not. If there will be a charge, the cost should be included. Items listed should include the best contact number for the seller.
- The newsletter will continue to include the Guild calendar.



NEWS & IDEAS

From Trish E.

I have made a New Year's resolution to actually count the number of quilts I finish in a year. I have tried in other years to do this, and never made it the whole twelve months. So I have come up with a new way to count. When I finish a quilt, completely done, label and all, I will cut a 10" square of fabric left over from that quilt. Fabric can be from anywhere in the quilt. I usually have sizable scraps from the backing, at the least, left over. At the end of the year, I will have a layer cake! The number of squares will be the number of quilts I have finished. And the resulting squares will provide a challenge for making a quilt in 2022! It would be nice to actually succeed at a resolution one year!

Congratulations to Ronnie P.! She won the raffle quilt made by Betty Ann A. for the Gingerbread Extravaganza. Click <u>HERE</u> to see it! The star quilt was designed by Sunnie M. You may recognize the pattern as one of our guild raffle quilts.

BLOCK of the MONTH

Each month we'll have a different 12" pattern. Being the same size, they can go together in a sampler style at the year's end, if you desire. Look for a quilt pattern with a setting that is the size, sashing, etc. you want (magazines are a great source!), and base your yardage needs on that, whether you use 1 repeated, or any combo of the 12 patterns, or more blocks.

Fabric Ideas:

- Blocks separated by sashing make great **scrap quilts**. The sash gives the quilt unity, so the blocks can be as different as your scrap basket allows.
- Each block has no more than 4 values, so you will need a **Dark, Medium, Light, and one other.** Feel free to trade the placement of values in any block (be sure to write the change on the pattern so the diagram doesn't fool you later!).

There is **NO YARDAGE OR CUTTING CHART for an entire quilt**.

Directions are for rotary cutting, and some blocks have options for construction. Please feel free to ask questions at any time, or come to Sit & Stitch for personal guidance!

TIPS FOR TRIANGLES

- 1) Be sure to sew the correct side of the triangle to another piece. All the triangles will have one long side and 2 short sides.
- 2) The bias grain (stretchy) edge is different according to how the triangles are cut, and they must be handled gently. All directions show cutting a square first, then dividing it. The sides of the square are always the straight grain (not stretchy).
- 3) When sewing 2 shapes together, match them in the center of the seam...fold and fingerpress a mark or use a pencil in the seam allowance. Many triangles have points that hang out beyond the other piece.
- 4) Press each seam before adding another piece.
- 5) When adding a third piece to a unit, sew with the triangle UP so you can see where the seams cross...that is the triangle's point and your needle should barely miss it on the seam allowance side.
- 6) Near the end of the seam the points really want to wander! Hold that seam allowance in place with a stiletto, scissors tip or other item!

SQUARING UP THE UNITS OR BLOCKS


Divide the Unfinished (raw edges) size (so it includes the seam allowance) by 2. That is the correct measurement from the center of the block to the raw edge.

Lay that ruler line on the center of the block. Whatever hangs over can be trimmed:

....**IF** it doesn't cut off a point or the seam allowance!....check seams, re-sew if needed to keep 1/4" seam allowance beyond the point.

.....IF the edge is too short, check seams and re-sew as needed, or re-press.

You need to check all four sides.



JANUARY BOM: Square in a Square

Finished block 12"

Cut pieces carefully.

Two squares cut diagonally equals the 4 triangles needed.

B is 1 square cut into 4 triangles.

SCANT 1/4" seam allowance is required!

- A) Corner Triangles: cut 2—7" squares. Cut each in half on the diagonal. These are cut slighter larger so you will trim the raw block to 12 1/2" when done. Maybe.
- B) Point to Sides Triangles: Cut 1—7 1/4" squares. Cut twice on the diagonal like an X.
- C) Middle Triangles: Cut 2—3 7/8" squares. Cut each on the diagonal.
- D) Center Triangles: cut 2 —4 1/4" squares. Cut each in half on the diagonal.
- E) Center Square: 3½"

Start sewing in the center. Add D triangles to opposite sides of the square, then add the other 2 triangles. Repeat for each size. **To measure as you go along**: E +D is 4 3/4

E/D + C is 6 1/2" After the Bs it is 9"

With As the block is 12 1/2 "unfinished (raw edges).

Easy Name Holder

FIRST get creative with your name. You will need a tag approximately 3" X 5" and you should be able to trim it to fit your holder. Print your name on paper or fabric. Hand or machine embroider it. Stamp it. Draw it. Even stickers will work. Use your imagination! Hold onto this name tag.

SECOND gather your supplies. Your sewing machine and basic sewing supplies. Also:

- 6 pieces of fabric at least 6" X 8" each
- 2 WOF strips 2-1/2" wide
- 1 piece of transparent vinyl 3" X 5". I will have these available.
- Wonder clips. I strongly recommend these as you will be sewing many layers together.
- 1 piece interfacing 6" X 8"
- Matching or neutral thread

THIRD prepare your pieces.

Sandwich the interfacing between two pieces of fabric wrong sides together.

- For the base, cut to 5-1/4" X 7". Pin these together and set aside.
- Place another 2 pieces of fabric wrong sides together. Cut to 5-1/4" wide X
- 4-1/2 long". Mark a dot 3-3/4" inches up from bottom on right 4-1/2" side.
- Place your ruler at top left side and the dot. Trim off the triangle. This will
- be the outer pocket. Pin these together and set aside.
- For the center pocket, place the last two 6" X 8" pieces of fabric wrong sides
- together. Cut to 5-1/4" wide and 6-1/2" long. Mark a dot on the left long
- side at 5" up from the bottom. Place your ruler at top right side and the dot.
- Trim off the triangle. Pin these together and set aside.

FOURTH prepare the binding using the 2-1/2 strips.

- Fold each in half to 1-1/4" width and press. Be sure to cut off the selvages.
- Cut three 6" lengths from one strip. These will bind the top of the base and the pockets. Using a bias seam, sew the remaining strip to the WOF strip.
- Next, turn in 1/4" on the raw edges of this long strip and press.

FIFTH sew the binding, and layer the base and pockets.

- Bind the top of the base, and the top of each pocket, using the 6" lengths.
- Sew to right side and fold over to reverse. Stitch in the ditch to secure. Trim
- these to base and pocket width.
- Now layer your pieces, starting with the
- base. Next
- place the center
- pocket, lining up edges. Then place the outer
- pocket, lining up edges. Last,
- place the clear vinyl on top of the outer
- pocket, lining up lower edges.
- Secure edges with Wonder Clips. Baste
- together, using a scant 1/4" seam.
- Starting with the center of the 2-1/2" strip, place it at the top right of your name tag holder with raw edges together. Wonder clip the binding to the
- right, bottom, and left side and stitch.

ADJUST STRAP LENGHTH AND FINISH SEWING.

- Hold your name tag holder up to yourself, and select a length that is
- comfortable for you. After cutting to correct length, sew the ends together.
- Fold in 1/4" on the raw edge side. Press. Fold strap in half, and sew closed along length.
- Insert name tag, and you are done.
